

The only candidate to successfully



Financial report: Investment growth tops 20% in FY 2011

THE MARYLAND STATE RETIREMENT AND PENSION SYSTEM'S PORTFOLIO earned

20.04% on investments in fiscal year 2011, raising assets to \$37.59 billion—an increase of \$5.75 billion over the previous year when the portfolio earned 14.03%.



The year also witnessed Governor Martin O'Malley's introduction and the legislature's passage of comprehensive pension reform


A note on forms

MARYLAND STATE RETIRE-MENT AGENCY FORMS such

as Designation of Beneficiary (Form 4), Statement of Disability (Form 20) and Election to Transfer Service (Form 37) are not effective until they are received in retirement agency offices in Baltimore.

A completed form received by your employer, but not forwarded to the retirement agency, is not valid.

Please also be aware that some retirement agency forms require a member to sign or have the form notarized, as indicated in the form's printed instructions. Forms submitted without the necessary signature or notarization are not valid and will be returned for completion.

Your spouse is welcome to attend, and sign language interpreters can be provided upon request. Contact your personnel office for information on upcoming seminars.

Retiring this year? Apply for an estimate now

IF YOU ARE PLANNING TO RETIRE IN JULY 2012 now is

the time to request an estimate of benefits. For members of the Employees', Teachers' and Correctional Officers' Systems, complete and submit to the Maryland State Retirement Agency an Application for an Estimate of Service Retirement Allowance (Form 9.) State Police should submit Form 10 and members of the Law Enforcement Officers' Pension System use Form 97. Necessary forms are available online at sra.maryland.gov or from your employer's personnel department.

You must be within 12 months of retirement eligibility to request an estimate. For members more than 12 months from retirement eligibility, the retirement agency provides printable benefit worksheets and online benefit estimators. These resources, which provide estimates only, are available online at sra.maryland.gov.

Has your address changed?

ANNUAL BENEFITS STATEMENTS, trustee election ballots and other important announcements are mailed directly to members of the Maryland State Retirement and Pension System. That's why it is important to keep your address up to date with the Maryland State Retirement Agency.

Have you moved since you first enrolled in the system? If so, please inform your employer of your new address. Your mailing address in retirement agency files will be updated automatically at the next pay cycle.

If you leave employment before retirement, you should submit your change of address directly to the retirement agency.

Mr. Haines is president of the Prince George's County Educators' Association, a bargaining agent with 9,000 members. For each of the last five negotiated agreements since 1998, he has been responsible for the cost-analysis of salary proposals during negotiations with the county school system.

Trustee Brown represented the interests of members and retirees of the Teachers' Retirement and Pension Systems, who elected him to four terms in office beginning in 1997. During his 14 years of dedicated board service, Mr. Brown was chairman of both the administrative and audit committees, vice chair of the investment committee and member of the corporate gover-

nance subcommittee. Upon retirement from a 30-year teaching career, Mr. Brown became ineligible for his board seat, which by law must be held by an active teacher. At his final meeting, the board thanked Mr. Brown for his "commitment to public service, sound judgment, diligent effort and persistent energy."

The 14-member board, which is responsible for establishing investment and administrative policy and overseeing the management of the system, meets each month at the system's administrative offices in Baltimore. Full meeting minutes are available at sra.maryland.gov the month following the meeting.
